FISHING RODEO ENTERING 20TH YEAR

Even though July's Fishing Rodeo is still a fresh memory, Wendy Irick, Director of Hospitality Operations, is already planning for next year's weekend-long tournament. "2011 will mark the 20th anniversary of the Annual Bald Head Island Fishing Rodeo, and we're excited about making it a great event," she said.

This year's event featured 21 teams competing in six categories: catch of the day tuna, dolphin and wahoo; billfish and overall total catch weight. Captain Barrett McMullan and his crew from Ocean Island, NC, fishing aboard the *OIFC*, reeled in the first-place prize of \$7,560 with a total tournament catch weight of 246.5 pounds.

Wendy said, "The employees who worked the Rodeo this year were great. They really made the tournament run smoothly and I want to thank them all." Emergency Weather Notice

As the summer season draws to a close, the threat of a weather emergency in our area rises. The Atlantic hurricane season runs from July 1 to November 30, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) has projected the 2010 season will have 14 to 20 named storms, with four to six becoming hurricanes of significant size or strength. Bald Head Island Limited has procedures in place for dealing with weather emergencies, and will distribute information both company-wide and by department as the need arises.

Weather conditions are monitored by The Adverse Weather Committee in conjunction with the Village of Bald Head Island. Together, they have established policies, procedures and action plans covering events prior to, during and after a weather emergency.

It is the policy of BHIL and affiliated companies to make every reasonable effort to safeguard life and property during periods of adverse or dangerous weather. It is the responsibility of each department head to develop an adequate plan, have the necessary equipment available and train personnel in proper execution of the plan.

Please know that facilities and operations on Bald Head Island are rarely closed, but, if a question regarding hours of work during a weather emergency arise, employees are responsible for contacting their supervisor or office for instructions. If the weather forces an evacuation of Bald Head Island, the employee hotline (910.457.7270) will be used to convey work status, provided the telephone system is operational.

For situations regarding pay status during emergency conditions, please check Section II of your copy of the Bald Head Island Handbook, or speak with your supervisor or the Human Resources Department for clarification or answers to specific questions.

This summer the temperatures have soared and so have our guest numbers. From Memorial Day weekend to June's Fishing Rodeo to the July 4th festivities to the Lighthouse Day celebration in August, the island has been filled with visitors.

According to Trisha Howarth, Hospitality Sales and Marketing Director, the summer has been extremely busy with property management reporting 100% occupancy on several occasions, and Eb & Flo's and the Maritime Market regularly breaking daily sales records. As Trisha pointed out, "Our staff continues to work hard to serve our guests and owners and we're proud of their work."

Fred Julius, Hospitality General Manager, echoed the sentiment, saying, "Events like those surrounding our 4th of July celebration would not go as smoothly without a dedicated and hard-working staff like the one we have here. BALD HEAD ISLAND, INTERNATIONAL DESTINATION

Every year, visitors come to Bald Head Island from a variety of international locations, but did you know that we also host international student workers as they study the American hospitality industry? This year, Bald Head Island Limited and International Educational Exchange, Inc. brought 42 students from around the world to our shores for the summer.

Wendy Irick, Director of Hospitality Operations for BHIL, oversees the international student worker program. "Since most of our international student workers are studying hospitality and/or tourism, they all come to us with some experience from previous internships," she said. "While they're with us they gain a lot of valuable experience working in hospitality, but they also get to improve their English skills, something that will serve them well when they move forward with their careers in the industry."

Miriam Khoury, a student from Peru spending the summer as a Rental Relations Coordinator, echoed this sentiment. "Speaking English everyday has helped me tremendously. To get a good job in the travel/hospitality industry in Peru you must speak fluent English. I can, and now I can help Americans and other English-speaking visitors when they come to Peru," she said.

Miriam's home town, Huancavo, is near Lima, the Peruvian capital, in the central highlands of the country. At 10,659 feet above sea level and surrounded by mountains, it's quite different from Bald Head Island. And, although she misses her family and friends in Peru, the experience she's gained with us at BHIL - from her work with guests to her new friends American and international alike to the time she's spent on the beach - will serve her for a lifetime in the hospitality and tourism industry. After she returns to Peru from the U.S., she plans to pursue more international work in Europe and after that, work in Peru at Machu Picchu - Cuzco, one of the Seven Wonders of the World.

"Our international students are such a treat to work with," Wendy said. "They have the best work ethic, are always smiling and are very dependable. Without them we wouldn't be so successful in meeting our guest satisfaction goals."

This year, our 42 international students came to us from Peru, Turkey, Colombia, Bulgaria, South Korea and Dominican Republic. Living and working on the island (they stay in Crew's Quarters on Maritime Way) from May to September, they experience the height of our tourist season and leave us well prepared for careers in hospitality and tourism.
